### Accessibility Plan 2024-2027

Abbeywood First School and Church Hill Middle School are committed to inclusive education for all. This means providing a school environment that enables full curriculum access. Abbeywood and Church Hill values and includes all pupils, staff, parents, carers and visitors regardless of their educational, physical, social, spiritual, emotional and cultural needs. This plan is drawn up in accordance with the Equality Act 2010. This Act states that '...schools cannot unlawfully discriminate due to age, disability, gender (or gender reassignment), marital status, pregnancy and/or maternity, race, religion or belief, sex or sexual orientation.

In performing their duties, all governors and staff will have regard to the Equality Act 2010.

### **Definition of Disability**

Disability is defined by the Equality Act 2010:

'A person has a disability if he or she has a physical or mental impairment that has a 'substantial' and 'long-term' adverse effect on his or her ability to carry out normal day to day activities'.

### **Principles:**

Compliance with the Equality Act 2010 is consistent with the operation of the school's SEND Information Report.

The schools recognise its duty under the Equality Act 2010 to:

- carry out accessibility planning, removing barriers for disabled pupils to ensure access to a full curriculum.
- increase the extent to which disabled pupils can participate and achieve in the curriculum, including staff development where necessary.
- improve the physical environment of the school to enable disabled pupils, staff, and visitors to take better advantage of education, benefits, facilities and services provided.
- improve the availability of accessible information to disabled pupils, staff, and visitors.

The school recognises and values parents and carers' knowledge of their child's disability and its effect on his/her ability to carry out normal activities and respects the parents and carers, and child's right to confidentiality. The school provides all pupils with a broad and balanced curriculum, co-designed and co-planned across the Central Region Schools Trust, adapted and adjusted to meet the needs of individual pupils, and enable all to achieve strong outcomes.
